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# Math Classes

## Algebra I: Grades 9-10

Mentor: Christin Perdue

Class Size: 8 - 15 Prerequisite: Pre-Algebra or 8th-grade math

Cost: \$405/year, payable monthly at \$45/month

Supply Fee: \$45

### Texts:

- Saxon Algebra I 3<sup>rd</sup> Edition Homeschool Kit (includes textbook, tests, and answers).

Note: Only the textbook and answers are needed for this course. Tests will be provided. The Homeschool Kit is a cheaper option, but both the Textbook and the solutions can be purchased separately.

\*Strongly recommended if you don't feel comfortable helping your student with problems at home. This contains the step-by-step solution for all problems in the book. The regular answer key contained in the homeschool kit only has the final answer, not the steps to get there.

**Supplies:** 3-ring binder with dividers for homework and tests, notebook paper, pocket folders (provided), pencils, pens, graph paper, and a basic scientific calculator. A graphing/scientific calculator is optional but recommended (Texas Instruments TI-83 or 83+). Supply Fee covers copies, in-class supplies, and handouts.

**Course Description:** This is an academic, high school-level Algebra I course. Topics covered include: equations and inequalities, graphing, scientific notation, ratios, percentages, variations, unit conversions, geometry, perimeter, area, volume, surface area, and English to metric conversions. Class time will focus on introducing new concepts, reviewing homework, and answering questions (as time allows).

**Homework:** 4-6 hours per week. Students will be expected to complete problem sets and tests at home, bringing questions to class. **Parent responsibilities include: ensuring honest completion, correction and grading of all HW problem sets, along with proctoring all at home tests (which will be closed-book/notes).** Mrs. Perdue will grade tests, review HW/confirm at home HW grading.

## Geometry: Grades 9-12

**Mentor:** Candice Dudley

**Class Size:** 3-15

**Prerequisite:** Algebra 1

**Cost:** \$360 per year, payable at \$40/month /student

Supply Fee: \$10

**Supplies:** 3-ring binder with dividers for homework and tests, notebook paper, 2 pocket folders, pencils, erasers, pens, graph paper, compass, protractor, ruler, and a scientific calculator-a basic scientific calculator is required. A graphing/scientific calculator is optional but recommended (Texas Instruments TI-83 or 83+).

**Course Description:** This is a high school-level Geometry course presented in the familiar Saxon approach. Incremental development and continual review keep the concepts fresh in students' minds. Topics covered include triangle congruence, postulates and theorems, surface area and volume, two-column proofs, vector addition, and slopes and equations of lines.

Homework will also include some algebra problems woven in to ensure that the material is not lost while our focus is on geometry. This is excellent preparation for standardized tests and/or future math classes. In class, we will be exploring new concepts, reviewing homework, and answering students' questions.

**Homework:** 4-6 hours/week. Students will be expected to complete problem sets and tests at home, bringing questions to class. Parents will verify that the problem sets have been completed, graded, and corrected. Mrs. Dudley will grade tests and investigations.

While the company currently offers a newer edition, there are ample used copies of the 5th edition available on Internet sale sites for less than \$20. I have acquired additional copies to rent out for the school year if the summer purchase price goes up. The companion Student Solutions Manual is not required since the student textbook provides a score key in the back for the questions we will be using, but it does provide a few additional steps to each solution instead of just the answer so some parents may choose to own a copy (ISBN # 0-13-418888-8).

**Course Description:** This is a High School level Algebra II course. Class time will focus on introducing new concepts and working practice problems. For homework, the students will be expected to complete problem sets and correct missed problems. Homework will be collected weekly. Quizzes are completed in class while tests will be sent home for parents to supervise. This particular class text focuses mainly on Algebra concepts so there will be a few extra worksheets at times to revisit important Geometry concepts or to introduce upcoming Chemistry or Physics applications of Algebra.

# Classes

## Earth Science: Grades 9-10

**Mentor:** Cindy Tweedy

**Class Size:** 5-15 Prerequisite: None

**Cost:** \$360/year, payable at \$40/month /student

**Supply Fee:** \$55

**Text:** Earth Science, 4th Edition, BJU Press (ISBN-13: 9781606820704) Earth Science Lab Manual, 4th Edition, BJU Press

**Supplies:** 3-ring binder for homework, quizzes, and tests, notebook paper, colored pencils, calculator (one on a phone works as well)

### **Course Description:**

This is a high school-level earth science course with labs taught from a Christian viewpoint. The course will cover topics such as mapping, geology, tectonic processes, soil and groundwater conservation, oceanography, meteorology, and astronomy. Students will read and study the six units at home. Class time will be utilized for labs, demonstrations, and discussions.

### **Homework:**

Students should expect 2.5/3 hours of homework per week. They will be required to read the assigned pages, complete the section notes, and answer the Chapter Review questions before attending class. Students will also compose lab reports and complete tests at home. Mrs. Brown will grade all assignments/tests and will hold students responsible for completing assignments as instructed. There will be occasional special projects throughout the year.

## Biology: Grades 9-11

**Mentor:** Liz Wetzel

**Class Size:** 6-16

**Prerequisite:** Pre-Algebra

**Cost:** \$40/month /student (\$360/year)

**Supply Fee:** \$60 (dissection specimens, lab supplies, copies, markers, erasers, shared Champions lab materials)

**Text:** Apologia Exploring Creation with Biology, 3rd edition Textbook  
ISBN: 978-1-946506-45-0 2.

**Supplies:** Three-ring binder with dividers, loose-leaf paper, pencils, pens, colored pencils, and homework folder/pocket portfolio

**Course Description:** This is a high school-level biology course with laboratory taught from a Christian perspective. It is recommended to take this course in the same year the student is taking Algebra I; a prerequisite is Pre-Algebra. Students will read and study the sixteen learning modules at home, and class time will be utilized for labs, group discussion, and clarification of challenging concepts. Modules cover atoms, chemical structures, ecosystems, biomes, ecological communities, cell structure and function, cellular energy, DNA, proteins, cell cycles, and genetics (including inheritance, disorders, and technology). Students will also learn about prokaryotes, viruses, protists, fungi, and the fascinating worlds of plants and animals.

Throughout laboratory exercises, students will frequently utilize a microscope, and they will dissect an owl pellet, earthworm, crayfish, grasshopper, perch, and frog during the year. Ideally, this course would be taken concurrently with Algebra 1. (Recommended for Grade 9.)

**Homework:** 2.5-3 hours/week. Students will be expected to read modules, answer “On Your Own Questions”, complete the study guide, compose lab reports, and complete tests at home. There will be occasional special projects throughout the year.

## Forensic Science: Grades 10-12

Mentor: Bridget Wilson

Class Size: 6-15

Prerequisite: None

Cost: \$35/month /student (\$315/year)

Supply Fee: \$45

**Text:** Forensic Science: Fundamentals and Investigations 2nd edition.

Students will be given a course code to enroll through Cengage.com. The current cost is \$59.95 for the MindTap digital platform and digital textbook. The cost for this is set by Cengage and not the mentor. The price is subject to change at any time without any notice.

**Supplies:** pencils, colored pencils, and homework folder/pocket portfolio

**Course Description:** This class introduces students to the fascinating world of forensic science, the science used to help solve crimes, and shows them how to find clues, analyze evidence, and crack the case. Students will develop the ability to think critically, creatively, and analytically through interesting, real-world case studies. This curriculum includes hands-on activities dealing with life, earth, and physical science topics. Projects include handwriting analysis, identifying fingerprints, analyzing blood spatter, and DNA analysis.

**Homework:** 1–2 hours/week. Students will be expected to read the assigned reading and complete any associated assignments, including composing lab reports at home. All assignments will be graded by the mentor, and students are expected to complete all assignments as directed.

## Physics: Grades: 11-12

(Grade 10 will be considered if demonstrably far enough along in math)

**Mentor:** Candice Dudley

**Class Size:** 3-15

**Prerequisites:** Algebra 1, geometry, basic trigonometry (sufficient to use sine, cosine and tangent operations)

**Cost:** \$360/year payable at \$40/month/student

**Supply Fee:** \$20

**Text:** Exploring Creation Through Physics, 2nd Edition Dr. Jay Wile Apologia ISBN 1-932012-42-7 and the Exploring Creation Through Physics 2nd Ed. Solutions and Test Booklet ISBN 1932012435

**Supplies:** 3-ring binder with dividers for class notes, handouts, worksheets, reports, etc. Calculator with scientific notation and trigonometric functions required.

**Course Description:** Physics is considered the foundation of all the natural sciences, focusing on the interaction between matter and energy. Physics governs all aspects of what happens around us and in us, from the subatomic level to the entire universe. This physics course is designed to stimulate critical thinking skills and provide an understanding of the world around us. This course provides a detailed introduction to the methods and concepts of general physics: one-dimensional and two-dimensional motion, Newton's laws and their application, gravity, work and energy, momentum, periodic motion, waves, optics, electrostatics, electrodynamics, electrical circuits, and magnetism. Students will formulate a list of the formulas used in this course and will have access to their list for their coursework and for tests. Despite the abundance of math in the textbook, this course will emphasize understanding the concepts.

Homework: 5-6 hours/week. Students will be expected to complete the reading assignments, OYO problems, practice problems, lab reports, and tests. Mrs. Dudley will grade tests and lab reports.

# American History: “Around the World with HIStory”

**Grades 10–12**

**Mentor:** Darlene Hoffman

**Class Size:** 8 - 16

**Prerequisite(s):** None

**Cost:** \$35 / month/student payable at \$315/ year

**Supply Fee:** \$30.00

**Course Description:** “Around the World With HIStory” offers a comprehensive survey of modern United States history. This chronological study begins with a brief overview of 19th-century America’s historical highlights—Manifest Destiny, Reconstruction, and more—setting the stage for a saturated study of 20th-century America through postmodern accounts. Special emphasis is also placed on the life of Evangelist Billy Graham, and his influence as friend and personal advisor to every president from President Truman to President Trump. This course is presented from a biblical worldview and provides an “out of the box” way of teaching and learning history. This class can be viewed as a supplementary prep tool for anyone planning to take the APUSH exam in the spring.

**Homework:** Students will complete reading and vocabulary assignments from select chapters of the Billy Graham autobiography each week. During each decade study, students will also be participating in independent research projects that they will present for class discussion. Research is prepared through various means: Some weeks they will prepare simple notecards and pictures. Other weeks they may be asked to type up their research presentation in MLA format. Quizzes are given in class approximately every three weeks (at the end of each decade study). The focal point for each decade will be the presidents of the twentieth century and the history that surrounded each administration. Students should plan for a minimum of 60 minutes/day in study between classes. In preparation for the study of Reconstruction at the beginning of the year, students will be asked to read Up from Slavery before the first class in August.

## World History: Grades: 9-12

**Class Size:** 6-20

**Prerequisites:** None

**Cost:** \$270/year payable at \$30/month/student

**Supply Fee:** \$50 (covers handouts, maps, tests, activities, supplies)

### **Supplies:**

College-ruled notebook paper, pencils/pens

(Mentor will provide 2 folders: one for handouts, and one for quiz/homework exchanges)

**Course Description:** This is a high school level history course with timelines and projects taught from a Christian viewpoint. Students will work through 30 learning modules by completing a full unit every week. Class time will be utilized for chapter concepts, activities, and group discussions. Students will study the story of man from the beginning of Creation, through the early civilizations, the rise and fall of Greece and Rome, the Middle Ages, the Renaissance, the Reformation, to the present. The Western Civilization curriculum also covers Latin America, Africa and Asia. This particular curriculum additionally provides a supplementary Literature reading list and Bible coursework for parents that wish to integrate the three subjects together at home for multiple course credits. During our class, we will focus on the history portion of the materials.

**Homework:** 3-4 hours per week. Homework includes chapter readings with questions, a choice of a weekly hands-on project to solidify the lessons, and easy preparations for short presentations (Pharaohs, ancient games, Emperors, etc.) 3-4 times during the year. Quizzes and tests that are sent home are monitored by the parent and returned in the student's folder the following week.

**Grading:** 20% Homework, 20% Projects, 10% Timeline Journal, 10% Presentations, 40% Exams & Quizzes

## Government: Grades 10-12

Class Size: 5 - 15

Prerequisite: None

Cost: \$35/month /student (\$315/year)

### Course Description:

This course will explore systems of Government from a Christian perspective. We will look at Federal, State, and local governments, branches of Government, the Constitution and Amendments.

Students will learn their rights and responsibilities as Christian citizens and the issues that face the United States today. At-home assignments/readings will be reinforced in class with hands-on activities, small group and class group discussions, and simulated or role-playing scenarios that mimic the branches of government. In addition, students will be encouraged to follow and discuss, in class and with parents, current issues involving government and civic duty. Students will need an electronic device for research for group and individual projects both in class and at home.

**Homework:** 4-6 hours weekly. Assignments to include reading, answering review questions, analyzing documents, essays, reviewing current events, quizzes, and test that will be proctored by parents.

## Economics & Personal Finance: Grades 10-12

**Class Size:** 4-20

**Prerequisite:** None, except that I will expect mature participation.

**Cost:** \$30/month /student (\$270/year)

**Supply Fee:** \$30 (includes printing costs of student handouts, articles, and quizzes, plus extra audio-visuals)

**Supplies:** A 3-ring notebook for keeping notes. Important: Internet access is required for this course, including the capability to watch online videos and access to formative.com, the homework platform.

### Course Description:

This is a combination of 2 courses:

- an overview study of free market economics, including principles of supply/demand, currency flow, inflation, wages, prices, debt, government spending, etc.
- a practical study of personal finances, including budgeting, saving and investing, credit, banking, insurance, taxes, etc. Students will do many hands-on activities, including balancing a checkbook, following stock market investments (via an online game), and creating a personal budget.
- The students will also design a small business, do an extensive Cost-Of-Living project, and write a resume.
- We will study both courses in tandem; part of the class time will be spent studying economics and part will be personal finance.

**Homework:** Plan on 30-45 minutes of work per day for the 4 days we are not in class. This involves reading the books and articles online and answering questions on formative.com

## English 9-10: Literature & Composition

**Mentor:** Wendy Embrey

**Class Size:** 4-20

**Prerequisite:** None

**Cost:** \$40/month /student (\$360/year)

**Supply Fee:** \$25 (Covers the cost of supplies, printing, and student handouts.)

**Text(s):** Year A (School year that begins with even years):

### **Course Description:**

This course will provide your student with the opportunity to explore different forms of literature. English 9/10 explores novels, some building blocks of literature, and a Shakespeare play. Reading assignments will focus on developing a love for reading, learning how to read literature well, and making connections with other great works of literature. Class discussion and assignments will challenge students to analyze and understand what they are reading. Written papers will focus on crafting a narrative well and learning to improve diction while developing the student's voice. Regular writing assignments will be returned with feedback and suggestions.

**Homework:** Students will be required to do 30 minutes to 1 hour of homework each day. This homework will primarily consist of reading, writing, and editing.

## English 11-12: Literature and Composition

**Class Size:** 4-20

**Prerequisite:** None

**Cost:** \$40/month /student (\$360/year)

**Supply Fee:** \$25 (supplies, printing, handouts)

**Texts:** Year A (School years that begin with even years):

**Supplies:** Binder or folder to organize handouts and papers, and supplies for taking notes.

**Course Description:** This course will provide your student with the opportunity to increase their writing proficiency, expand their knowledge of literature, and prepare for college writing assignments. English 11/12 explores novels, short stories, poems, essays, and a Shakespeare play. Reading assignments will focus on developing a love for reading, learning how to read literature well, and making connections with other great works of literature. Class discussion and assignments will challenge students to analyze and understand what they are reading. Students will also become familiar with literary terms that will expand their vocabulary. Written papers will focus on creating a strong thesis, followed by supporting a thesis by using textual evidence, and will feature informative, persuasive, descriptive, and narrative writing. Students will expand their writing skills through regular writing assignments which will be returned with feedback and suggestions. Students will find and use quality reference material, cite and paraphrase sources, and apply proper editing (MLA format). English 11/12 will introduce students to quality literature while developing formal writing skills that will be required of them for the rest of their lives.

**PLEASE NOTE** that these students are 11th and 12th grade students, getting ready to graduate and finish their high school studies. They will be expected to read and discuss literature that may not necessarily reflect a Christian worldview, although the teacher holds a Christian worldview and will filter discussions through that mindset in the prayerful hope that the discussions will equip students to think through some complicated topics.

**Homework:** Students will be required to do 30 minutes to 1 hour of homework each day. This homework will primarily consist of reading, writing, editing, and researching.

**Course Description:** Creating a written publication involves many disciplines – writing, editing, proofreading, interviewing, researching, brainstorming, organizing, and designing. In class students will learn and practice each of these disciplines until, by the end of the year, they put them all to use publishing the CHAMPIONS “yearbook.”

The first half of the course introduces students to the various writing styles of journalistic reporting. Students will write news stories, feature stories, and editorials using the accepted AP (Associated Press) style. They will learn how to conduct interviews, do background research, and communicate events using unbiased language. The second half of the course focuses on graphic design. Students learn the do's and don'ts of proper page and story layout and experiment with fundamental elements of design to present their writing and photographs in pleasing and readable formats.

From February through late April, students will work exclusively on the yearbook. Each student will be assigned several CHAMPIONS classes to cover, gathering information by sitting in on those classes, taking notes, and interviewing the mentor and students. They will also be asked to take pictures in those classes. Students will design display advertising for CHAMPIONS family businesses and design a seniors' page featuring that year's graduating seniors with photos and bios. Layout of the yearbook will involve learning to use Canva design app for designing pages and helping to input text and photos into the InDesign program on my laptop to prepare for publication.

**Homework:** Each week during the first half of the course, students will complete handwritten worksheet exercises and/or typed writing assignments (submitted in 12-point Times Roman, double-spaced). For yearbook assignments, students will turn in electronic copies of their designed pages to me via email or the Canva app. Time spent on homework ranges from 1/2 hour to 2 hours per week. During the second half of the course, the only “homework” is putting together yearbook pages in class.

## Creative Writing and Storytelling: Grades 9-12

**Mentor:** Cathy Harris

**Class Size:** 4-12

**Prerequisite:** none (basic grammatical skills are expected)

Cost: \$35/month/student (\$315 annual)

**Supply Fee:** \$40 (includes copies of class reading materials, peer review worksheets, and instruction)

**Text(s):** None

### Supplies:

- 3-ring binder with dividers for homework, peer review worksheets, poems/short stories/literature excerpts
- 1-inch white clear cover 3-ring binder for author portfolio
- Notebook paper
- Bible
- Pocket folders-2 (with holes)
- Highlighters
- Pens/Pencils

This course introduces students to the craft of creative writing through poetry, short stories, personal narrative, and creative nonfiction. Students will also consider the biblical role of creativity in storytelling, narration, and teaching using the Psalms and Parables. The course will include reading and discussing creative works across several genres, including excerpts from classic literature to imitate and explore an individual student's gifts, interests, voice, and style. Students will study literary techniques and apply those techniques to their own writing to develop strong writing skills. Emphasis will be placed on imagination, storytelling structure, descriptive language, and the revision process. The course will also include weekly fun in-class writing prompts and an in-depth short story assignment with drafts, edits, and reviews. The course will include peer feedback and critique. Students will build a portfolio of original writing by the end of the course.

**Homework:** Weekly writing assignments and/or revisions. Students should expect 2.5/3 hours of homework per week.

# Fine Arts

## Learning Piano: By Note and By Chords: Grades 9-12

**Mentor:** Lori Payne

**Class Size:** 4-8

**Prerequisite:** NO musical experience required

**Cost:** \$25/month/student (\$225/year) **Supply Fee:** \$20 (for copies of handouts)

**Texts:** \*John Thompson's Modern Course for the Piano, The First Grade Book (\$6.99)  
(ISBN# 978-0877180050)

\*Alfred's Essentials of Music Theory: Book 1 (\$8.50)(ISBN# 978-0882848945)

### Supplies Needed:

- At home, the student should have access to a piano or a keyboard for practice.
- A folder or binder to organize handouts
- Lined notebook paper and a pencil for writing scales and making notations
- If your student has a portable keyboard he/she can bring each week to class, please do so, though this is not required for participation. I prefer every student to have a keyboard to play on in class-- there is only one piano in the room, and I have only two I can lend out.

**Course Description:** This course is for ANY student, NO MATTER THE AGE, who has ever wanted to play the piano. Students will learn the basic elements of note-reading for the piano, and, in addition, learn scales, finger exercises, and chords, and how to apply them by ear to hymns and worship songs.

The main text is First Grade, NOT Primer level, assuming older students will be better challenged by it and able to catch on to the material more quickly. However, this means at least the first two classes will begin with a review of preparatory music theory – the staff, note values, time signatures, finger numbering and the basic C position and notes on the piano – for which I have prepared handouts. If a student has experience with another instrument and/or already understands musical notation, that is wonderful and will only make it easier for he/she to progress to piano, but even those without a music background should do well. After the initial review, we will work through the text, which continues instruction with each piece learned. A workbook reinforces note identification and music theory with written exercises.

Beyond the text, students will be taught the circle of fifths and basic chord positions, inversions and patterns in preparation for using them in improvisation of songs by ear. We will begin with simple tunes like “Jingle Bells” and “Jesus Loves Me” and progress to other well-known choruses, the goal being for students to adapt these chord patterns to compositions of their own choice beyond class and into the future.

Each student will play their "homework" at the piano for a grade and receive individual instruction as well as group learning and demonstration. There will be a recital for all CHAMPIONS piano students and my private piano students at the end of April. Students will choose one of the songs they've learned during the year to play for it.

**Homework:** Students will be given homework each week—written exercises in the Music Theory book, as well as piano “homework” which they will be expected to practice daily and check off on a Practice Log sheet (15-20 minutes per day, minimum 5 days per week) which counts toward their grade.

## Advanced Piano II & III: Grades 9-12

**Mentor:** Lori Payne

**Class Size:** 4 - 10

**Prerequisite:** Learning Piano I (CHAMPIONS class) OR minimum one year of piano lessons

**Cost:** \$25/month/student (\$225/year)

**Supply Fee:** \$20 (for copies of handouts)

### Supplies Needed:

- At home, the student should have access to a piano or a keyboard for practice
- Three-Ring Binder for holding copies of extracurricular piano music
- Pencil and eraser
- Lined notebook paper
- OPTIONAL: If your student has a portable keyboard he/she can bring each week to class, please do so, though this is not required for participation. I prefer every student to have a keyboard to play on in class-- there is only one piano in the room, and I have only two I can lend out.

### Course Description:

This course continues where the first (or second) year course leaves off, taking students through John Thompson's Second Grade book, which explores more advanced piano fingering techniques, key signatures and rhythms. Students will now learn minor scales and corresponding chords, cadence chords, dominant seventh chords, extended finger positions, 3/8 time, cut and common time, trills, triplets, pedal usage, and, along with playing classical pieces, will learn background information on their composers such as Bach, Hayden, Beethoven and Liszt. More work will be done on applying chords by ear to familiar worship choruses and hymns, coming up with pleasant left-hand patterns and chorded right hand arrangements using inversions. The text and handouts further expose students to other styles of music, such as folk, jazz, blues and pop. Weekly piano drill exercises from the Hanon book will strengthen and increase speed and flexibility of fingers.

Each student will play their "homework" at the piano and receive individual instruction as well as group learning and demonstration. Students will play for a recital at the end of April.

**Homework:** Students will be given "homework" every week, to include written music theory workbook exercises and playing piano pieces, scales and/or drills, which they will be expected to practice daily and record onto a Practice Log sheet (15-20 minutes per day, minimum 5 days per week) and counts as part of their grade. There will be occasional fill-in-the-blank biography worksheets on each composer.

## Explorations in Art: Grades 9-12

**Mentor:** Lori Payne

**Class Size:** 4-15

**Prerequisite:** None

**Cost:** \$225 payable at \$25/month per student

**Supply Fee:** \$75 (Includes a watercolor paint set, acrylic paint set, soft pastel set, basic charcoal set, and hardcover journal book for each student to keep, as well as clay, paper, canvas, and other consumable art materials students will share.)

**Text:** None

### Supplies:

- Students must supply an **ART KIT in a cardboard or plastic box** which they will **bring to class each week**. It should include: #2 pencils, ruler, pencil sharpener, scissors, natural sponge(s), black permanent marker (Sharpie), ballpoint pen, small jar/cup for water, paintbrushes of various sizes, masking tape, white eraser, x-acto knife, white glue, sample size bar of soap, baby wipes, and a glue stick. These must be replenished as needed throughout the year. Occasionally they will be asked to bring in other materials such as empty milk jugs, cardboard or yarn!
- To protect clothing from paints, clay and other materials, students should consider either purchasing an **artist's smock** or bringing an **old t-shirt** to wear over their clothing!
- Each student will contribute a certain number of **\$1 rectangular plastic tablecloths**, to be determined when the total number of students in the class is known.

**Course Description:** This course is for students of ALL ages and any artistic skill, from 9th grade through high school senior. Explorations in Art is a survey course which exposes students to a variety of art media. Each art medium (for example, charcoal, acrylic paint or clay) has its own particular characteristics, and each requires its own technique for creating art. The goal of this class is to introduce students to the joy of working with each of these materials and to instruct them in their use while exploring various art subjects and styles. For example, students will use pastels to create a still life or will learn the basics of charcoal while creating a portrait.

The following media and subjects are covered by the course:

**tempera paint** -- color wheel/theory/mixing, **felt & block** -- print-making/pattern & motif, **acrylic paint**-- palette knife painting, **watercolor paint** -- silhouette landscape/wash, **soft pastel** -- still life/landscape, **papier-mâché** -- folk art (theater masks), **yarn/weaving** -- textile art, **clay** -- pinch/coil pottery, **scratch board** -- animal portraits/texture, **decoupage/collage** -- abstract expressionism, **charcoal** -- portrait drawing, **paper** -- paper cutting/origami

**Credits Earned:** 1 Fine Arts credit

## Art with Pen and Ink: Grades 9-12

**Mentor:** Lori Payne      **Class Size:** 4-12 **Prerequisite:** None

**Cost:** \$225, payable at \$25/month per student

**Supply Fee:** \$25 for copies of handouts

**Text:** None

### Supplies:

- Sturdy Folder/Portfolio in which to keep and carry work and instructional handouts
- Three kinds of black pens:
  - fine black gel pens (Pentel or Pilot G2 gel pen, 7 mm or smaller)
  - black ballpoint pens (Bic or Papermate 1.0 mm or smaller)
  - extra-fine black permanent markers (Sharpie fine stylo no-bleed marker preferred)
- Pad of tracing paper, 9” x 12”
- #2 pencils, pink eraser and RULER
- 10” x 12” (or larger) light pad with electric cord to plug into wall or charger. We will be using this to trace photograph enlargements for our drawings.

**Course Description:** Many students who thought they were not “artistic” have been successful in this style of drawing! Why? Because we begin with a traced pencil outline in correct proportion and reproduce shading and texture using strategically placed strokes from a pen!

This course introduces students to the techniques of pen and ink illustration. As they learn and draw, they will build a portfolio of several subjects (animals, portraits, buildings, and landscapes), suitable for framing. First, students will learn and practice the basic strokes of pen and ink drawing (hatching, crosshatching, contour hatching, scumbling and stippling). Next, they will discover how to work from enlarged black and white copies of photographs or magazine pictures of subjects, how to trace and transfer in pencil, how to recognize and outline graduated areas of shadow, and then how to apply the pen strokes they’ve learned to create shading, texture, and depth in their illustrations. When learning to draw buildings, a lesson in perspective will be taught and practiced. Students will also enhance certain pen and ink drawings with “wash” techniques using grayscale and colored markers.

For a final project, students will create a pen and ink cover illustration for a book of their choice, combining elements and subjects in an original design.

**Homework:** There is NO homework for this class, unless a student gets behind and needs to complete a drawing to turn in by the deadline. Students will work on their drawings during class hours.

**Credits Earned:** 1 Fine Arts credit

## Watercolor: Grades 9-12

**Mentor:** Michelle Lieb

**Class Size:** 2-6

**Prerequisite:** None

**Cost:** \$270 a year, payable at \$30/month

**Supply Fee:** \$35 (which covers absorbent cloths and sponges, spray bottles and droppers, trays for stretching, loose watercolor paper, masking fluid, artists' masking tape, etc.)

### Supplies:

- Portfolio or folder in which to keep and carry work and handouts
- Watercolor brushes: mop brush (goat hair recommended) OR one 1.5 or 2 inch wash brush (synthetic/sable blend recommended), one large round brush (#8, 9 or 10), one small round brush (#2, 3 or 4), one medium round brush (#5 or 6), one flat brush (1/2 - 1 inch width), and 1 rigger OR liner brush
- Paper: Two 140 lb paper Cold Press Arches watercolor paper blocks (not spiral bound). One must be 9x12 and the other can be a size of your choice. Each should have about 12 or more pages.
- Paints: At least the three primary colors (red, yellow, and blue) and at least one earth tone such as a sienna, umber, sepia or ochre (as close to professional grade tube paints as your budget allows). I recommend Holbein, Daniel Smith or Windsor and Newton. I recommend any of the Windsor and Newton student grades like Cottman if you need to save money. Optional but recommended would be variations in the primary colors (a cool blue and a warmer blue, a cool red and warmer red, etc.) as well as a grey tone. White and black are not necessary but can be used. Green, yellow and violet are also OK, but not necessary. Students do not need many colors as they will be mixing most of their own. If you already have professional grade pan or half pan colors, you may go ahead and use those instead of purchasing tube paints, but I HIGHLY recommend tube paints.
- Paint palette
- 2 water containers (clear sturdy cups or closable glass jars work)
- drawing pencil(s)
- eraser

**Course Description:** This course teaches students techniques and styles of watercolor painting. The class will cover proper use of watercolor materials and tools, including brushes, surfaces, watercolor paint and stylistic tools. Students will learn different application techniques, color theory and mixing, painting highlights and shadows, different watercolor styles, creating texture and depth in landscapes, still life, portraits and more. Students will follow along step-by-step with guided paintings and will progress to create their own paintings from their own photos and from plain air painting opportunities.

**Homework:** There is no required homework for this class unless a student gets behind and needs to complete a painting to turn in by the deadline. Students will work on their paintings during class time. However, it is HIGHLY recommended that if a student wants to really improve at a more accelerated rate, working at home will greatly advance their skills.

## American Sign Language: Grades: 9-12

**Mentor:** Carla Hoke

**Class Size:** 6-14

**Prerequisites:** None

**Cost:** \$270 payable at \$30/month per student

**Supply fee:** \$30 (worksheets, quizzes, activities, games, electronics, and kinesthetics)

### Texts:

**Supplies needed weekly:** textbook referenced on the syllabus, flashcards, & class handouts

**Course Description:** This is a high school-level sign language course that incorporates vocabulary, ASL terminology, ASL grammar/semantics/sentence structure, ASL career information, deaf history & biographies, and music & storytelling practice. We include games, teambuilding, and worksheets.

\* The first semester focuses on advancing quickly through the alphabet and finger signs for vocabulary in 12 main areas (foods, names, places, travel, seasons, times, numbers, health, sports, animals, emotions, & shopping). The students focus on handshapes, expressions, asking questions, learning sentence structure, using words with clear meanings, holding conversations, and signing songs. We also study important people in the deaf community and culture.

\* The second semester includes vocabulary lists ([www.lifeprint.com](http://www.lifeprint.com) and Bill Vicars), advanced tips for storytelling practice (facial features/eye gazing/body movement), using identifiers & classifiers, using abbreviated phrases, recognizing story structures (openings/transitions/ closings/character descriptions), and learning a few advanced concepts (time/numbers/word choice/asking questions).

\* For both semesters, we have in-class practice, games, worksheets, videos, and group projects. The students will have additional resources for researching signs and stories online. By the end of the year, student vocabulary levels will allow them to converse with friends, ask questions, sign music pieces, tell stories, and understand a bit of deaf culture.

**Homework:** 3+ hours per week. Homework includes chapter readings with questions, flashcards or a weekly hands-on project to solidify the lesson, and easy preparations for super short presentations.

**Grading:** attendance, class participation, worksheets, homework assignments, quizzes, & projects

**Credits Earned:** 1 language Credit

## Biblical Survey: Grades 9-12

**Class Size:** 5-20

**Prerequisite:** None

**Cost:** \$30/month /student (\$270/year)

## Computer Technology & Digital Applications: Grades 9-12

**Cost:** \$315/year payable at \$35/month /student

**Text:** Access to interactive online textbook is included in the supply fee

**Supplies:** See hardware and software requirements below.

**Course Description:** This course covers fundamental computing topics and skills such as:

- Hardware, software, and operating systems
- Managing files and folders
- Basic networking
- Online safety and computer security
- Using Word processors, spreadsheets, and presentation programs
- Creating simple databases
- Image editing
- Using social media and email communications
- Introductory website design
- Simple computer programming concepts
- Exploration of computing careers

The course material is designed to appeal to a variety of students, from traditional learners who thrive on written text to audio-visual students who enjoy a multi-media format. All content is delivered through an online system that allows students to work seamlessly both in the classroom and at home. Hands-On Activities: every chapter contains one or more hands-on activities that allow students to practice and demonstrate understanding of the lesson topics. Activities can be completed on any Windows, Mac OS, Chromebook, or tablet device when using online options (like Google Docs). **Course Description:** \*\*\* NEW AND IMPROVED\*\*\* As technology continues to grow and screen time worsens, it is a challenge to get teenagers up and moving! Outdoor activities, making fitness part of their daily routine, and accountability have become almost nonexistent. This course will introduce and have open discussion topics on but not limited to: personal health options, fitness routines for all fitness levels, safety techniques and much more! ## Photography: Grades: 9-12 - **NOT OFFERED 2026/2027**

**Mentor:** Michelle Lieb

**Class Size:** 5-8

**Prerequisites:** None

**Cost:** \$35/month/student (\$315 total)

**Supply Fee:** \$30

**Required Equipment:** functional phone camera, mirrorless camera, point and shoot, DSLR or other camera with manual control options and either a printer or a local printing option (Walgreens or similar).

**Supplies:** notebook for handouts, access to a digital camera or phone camera  
Recommended: Adobe Lightroom.

**Course Description:** Students will learn the basics of the mechanical fundamentals of a camera, including lens and shutter operations, compositional elements, and principles of design, image editing and presentation and how to critique and self-evaluate their work. They will explore photographic genres such as landscape, motion, still life, and portraiture as well as flatlays for social marketing. Students will learn about up-to-date careers in photography and how to pursue them. We will work with seshows, lectures, hands-on training, setting up still-life compositions outside and inside, work on real-time portraiture, and hopefully be able to meet up for a field trip.

**Homework:** Varies. 1-hour per week minimum, maybe up to 4 hours for photographing and printing. Images will be due most weeks.
